- Discuss new strategies and approaches to incompatibility and KPD.
- Describe team dynamics and strategies to improve working relationships.

- Discuss financial barriers and current initiatives to make living donation cost neutral.
- Describe the current national and international status of Covid-19 pandemic and its impact on Transplantation.
- Discuss the need for crucial conversations in the healthcare setting.
- Discuss management of psychosocial challenges with living donors in difficult, disappointing and hierarchical situations.
